long black coat and black cowboy hat. (Imagine Bart Maverick of the old television series.) It was a bright, sunny day and we were on the large wooden deck of their hillside home overlooking the golf course. It was all very Southern California and the assembled guests reflected the casual style of the area. Suits, cruise wear, expensive and not so expensive leans. shorts and flip flops all mixed together as the guests awaited the stars of the event.

The crowd guieted as the bride and groom stepped in front of the judge officiating at the civil ceremony... however, let me stop here and go back a few years.

Born six years before me, Ivan was already seven when Pearl Harbor jolted America into the war. For him, growing up during the conflict, the war meant headlines, uncles in service, and worried parents. For me, as I was growing, the war was over and was represented by plastic toys and war movies. During Ivan's childhood, Dad was still working his way up the economic ladder, busy providing for his growing family. Six or seven years later, he was in management, soon to be an owner. The times can shape a person, making him tougher and more of a risk taker. That was my brother. I loved him heart and soul.

He always identified with the hard edged characters he saw in the movies and, in a way, they became role models. Personalities like James Dean, Dana Andrews, John Wayne -- tough guys sometimes getting into trouble because they would never back down. To the world, that's how Ivan often presented himself, especially in his early years. Never to me.

Jewish, but not observant, and though he was the only Jew in his high school in the late forties and early fifties, he didn't hide in the shadows. With his collar turned up, black leather jacket with four zippered pockets, motorcycle boots and his hair combed just right with a few strands on his forehead, this young Marlon Brando formed the school's first car club. The leather jacketed "Road Kings" had an affiliate club, the "Road Queens", similarly garbed, as companions for parties, dances and movies. Fonzie would have fit right in.

He was proud of being a member of an ancient tribe that had toughed it out throughout the centuries.

However, if there were those who wanted to make



trouble about who he was, he was ready. Though tough on the outside, he was naturally charitable and philanthropic, working with disadvantaged youths and helping those in need. When older and in the business world (earning a BS in Metallurgy, a BA in Business Administration and a DC in Chiropractic) he did become more tempered, however he still did things "his way", but more often with a smile and subtlety.

But, back to the ceremony on the deck. So now this popular and prosperous businessman, President of the Kiwanis, a civic leader with a good sense of humor and a reputation for being a bit of a stiff neck in business negotiations was getting married.

The cowboy couple stepped forward, the judge said a few preliminary words and then, Ivan made a silent statement. With a bit of theatrical flourish, he removed his black cowboy hat to reveal a white satin kippah which gleamed in the bright California sun. He looked over his shoulder at me and smiled. Biography of the Month: Mark Fields

My bio last month of **Hedy Lamarr** came from an email I received. This last month I received an email from our member **Sheilah Hart** that I am sharing for this month. I edited it to include more up-to-date information.

Mark Fields, Chief Operating Officer (COO) of Ford Motor Company since December of 2012, will be making history July 1 when he succeeds Alan Mulally as Ford Chief Executive Officer. He will become one of the highest-ranking Jewish executives in the global automotive business. Fields will be the first Jewish person to, in effect, run the 111-year-old international automaker with 164,000 employees.

A Jew running Ford, the company founded by **Henry Ford**, one of the most notorious anti-Semites in American history? Veteran observers of the automotive scene thought it could never happen. But it's a new era at Ford, an era that actually started when the elder Ford's grandson, **Henry Ford II**, took over the company in the 1940s and launched his version of affirmative action.

Ford II, a friend of philanthropist **Max Fisher** and other Jewish leaders and frequent contributor to the old United Jewish Appeal, hired Jewish, African American and other minority employees, and installed minority dealers and suppliers. What's even more important, many of the minority employees rose to higher ranks within Ford than did those at GM and Chrysler.

Mark Fields was born January 24, 1961 in Brooklyn into a Romanian/Russian Jewish family. The family name was originally **Finkelman**. His father **Gerald** was a purchasing manager and avid golfer who died in 2005. His mother **Elinor** lives in Wyckoff, New Jersey. Mark and his two older brothers grew up in Paramus, New Jersey. He had his bar mitzvah at Conservative Congregation Beth Tikvah there. After graduation from Paramus High School, he earned a BA in Economics at Rutgers and a MBA at Harvard. In between, he worked for six years at IBM in marketing and sales.

Fields has been an employee at Ford for 25 years, holding a variety of positions. In 1989, Ford was seeking potential executives with product sales and marketing experience as part of a new marketing leadership program. His first job was as a marketing manager for the Thunderbird car line. "I loved cars, so Ford was a perfect fit for me," reflected Fields, who had a collection of 100 mini cars as a youngster.

By corporate standards, Fields rose pretty quickly through the Ford ranks. He held managerial positions at offices in California, Dearborn, and Detroit.

In 1996, he became assistant managing director of Ford Argentina in Buenos Aires (where only about 1/2 percent of the population is Jewish), then managing director a year later when his predecessor took ill. In two years there, he helped turn the affiliate around from a \$100 million loss to a \$2 million profit.

After that, it was off to Hiroshima, Japan, for several posts at Mazda, leading up to executive vice president and assistant to the president. Only a few weeks later, fate intervened again when the president retired unexpectedly because of ill health — and Field moved right to the top as president and CEO. Ford owned controlling interest of Mazda at the time. "You must be joking," was the response from Fields' wife, Jane, whom he had met in Atlanta, Ga., during his IBM days, when he told her of the promotion. "She just laughed and refused to believe me," Fields mused. "It was so soon after my previous promotion. But she quickly got used to it."

Fields had to overcome several obstacles as the "brash young foreign" Mazda chief, including the "element of surprise when they found out I was Jewish," he recalls. "There are all kinds of religions there ... but there certainly are no Jews in Japan. "But I never experienced any anti-Semitism there, and I have never encountered one iota of discrimination as a Jew during my career at Ford," he said. His mother used to send him packages of matzah and Chanukah candles around the world to remind him to keep up his Jewishness.

Fields led Mazda through a period of significant transformation, reducing losses through restructuring and a series of cost-cutting measures. That performance earned his promotion to executive vice president of Ford of Europe and CEO of the company's Premier Automotive Group, handling all activities of the company's premium vehicle business, including cars like Jaguar and Aston Martin.

Bill Ford Jr. then summoned him from Europe to take over the Americas organization during the trying times beginning in 2005. This led to his promotion in 2012 to COO responsible for everything in Ford's worldwide business operations from Product Development, Manufacturing, and Labor Affairs, to Purchasing, Quality, Environment and Safety Engineering, and Information and Technology.

May Mark Fields enjoy continued success, and lead to more opportunities for Jewish auto executives.

My Upcoming Trip to Israel by Stan Schroeder

As many of my readers know, I am passionate about our Jewish State



of Israel and visit almost every year. I have signed up for a trip organized by **Stephen S. Wise Temple** in Los Angeles. It is located across the street from American Jewish University and has an extensive Israel program and many supporters. The group of more than 80 leaves June 15 and returns June 26.

I had considered other organizations offering tours this year, but wasn't satisfied for various reasons. So I searched on the internet and was attracted to several places and activities on the itinerary. There will be two tracks, the first one is for families and those who haven't been to Israel before. The second is for adults who have been to Israel and are seeking a different experience.

Among the things I found exciting are:

Visit Herzliyah's Interdisciplinary Center (IDC)
Lauder School of Government, Diplomacy, and
Strategy, to learn about Israel's diplomatic and
strategic challenges

Continue to Atlit, site of the **pre-state British Detention Camp for "illegal" Jewish immigrants**which tells the story of the struggle of Jews fleeing
Europe (*Ma'apilim*), trying to reach British controlled
Palestine, only to be incarcerated by the British in
camps similar in appearance to the Nazi camps of
Europe.

Visit the **Mahmood Mosque** with members of Haifa's Ahmadiyya Muslim community.

Visit a **Druze village** for a dialogue with communal leaders on the complex identity challenges that they face as Arab Druze within Israeli and Arab society.

Explore the beautifully restored **19th century Rosh Pina village** and learn about the early Zionist
Halutzim pioneers who dreamt and built there

Visit and sing at the **Kinneret Cemetery** where many early Zionist pioneers are buried. We'll focus on the early Zionist poet **Rachel Blaustein** and Israel's songwriter laureate **Naomi Shemer**.

Session at the hotel with **Khaled Abu Toameh**, Arab Affairs Correspondent for the Jerusalem Post: *Can Israel and the Palestinian Authority Make Peace?*

Guided drive around the **Jerusalem seam line** including Jewish and Arab housing in the contested Shimon HaTzadik/Sheik Jarrah neighborhood, Har Homah and outlook into Bethlehem. Meet local residents and hear a variety of perspectives about coexistence in Jerusalem.

Depart to the slopes of **Mt. Scopus** to participate in an **archeological salvage dig**, sifting through soil and artifacts from the Temple Mount.

Meet students at the **Megemeria School of Jewelry** and see how the Yvel Jewelry Company is helping to train Ethiopian Jewish Immigrants and integrate them into the work force.

Visit Ben Gurion University of the Negev for a VIP tour. Meet some of Israel's top researchers and professors and learn about Israel's pre-eminent place in the fields of bio medical research and environmental innovation. Consider how David Ben Gurion's vision of making the desert bloom is being updated and applied

Meet young pioneering residents of an **Ayalim student village**. The Ayalim Association goal is to strengthen existing communities and social involvement in the Negev and Galilee, to revive and renew the Zionist idea in the 21st century through the establishment of student and entrepreneur villages.

In addition, other activities include:

Visit to Yad Vashem and Mount Herzl Cemetery.

Tour Western Wall tunnels.

Tower of David spectacular Sound and Light Show

Shabbat at Hebrew Union College

Independence Hall: the birth of the State of Israel with a dramatic reenactment where **David Ben Gurion** declared the establishment of the State of Israel in May 1948.

Most important, I will have time to appreciate Israelis, themselves, who personify the Jewish State I love and for which we are all grateful for. I will see the young IDF soldiers who serve to protect the State. I will be inspired again by the spirit and vitality of all kinds of Israelis: young and old, observant and secular, Jewish and Arab, all religions, colors, and ethnicities.

I will have much to share when I return.

Shavuot Starts Tuesday Evening, June 3

The holiday of **Shavuot**, celebrating the concluding **festival of the grain harvest** in Israel and **the giving of the Torah to the Israelite nation at**



Mount Sinai, occurs exactly 50 days after the start of Passover. We count the days starting the second night of Passover for 49 days. This counting of the *omer* is accomplished by saying a prayer "blessed is God who commanded us to perform this counting" in the Torah (Leviticus 23:15). An *omer* is a dry measure for grain equal to one tenth of an *ephah* (approximately one bushel). In the days of the Temple an *omer* of barley was cut down and brought to the Temple on the second day of Passover as an offering. The word *shavuot* means weeks, thus the name of the holiday is derived from the seven weeks of counting.

In the days of the Temple an offering of two loaves of bread from the wheat harvest was made on Shavuot. It was also the first day on which Israelites brought **first fruits** (*bikkurim*) to the Temple. The *bikkurim* were brought from the seven species in the land of Israel praised in Deuteronomy 8:8:

wheat, barley, grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives, and dates.

Jewish farmers would tie a reed around the first ripening fruits from each of these species in their fields. At the time of harvest, the fruits identified by the reed would be cut

and placed in baskets woven of gold and silver. The baskets would then be loaded on oxen whose horns were gilded and laced with garlands of flowers, and who were led in a grand procession to Jerusalem. As the farmer and his entourage passed through cities and towns, they would be accompanied by music and parades.

On Shavuot we read the **Book of Ruth**. Among the reasons for this reading:

King David, Ruth's descendant, was born and died on Shavuot (Talmud)

The events of Book of Ruth occur at harvest time

Ruth was a convert, and all Jews also entered the covenant on Shavuot, when the Torah was given.

There is a tradition among Ashkenazi Jews of eating dairy foods such as cheesecake, cheese blintzes, and cheese kreplach on Shavuot. It is also customary to study Torah all night on Erev Shavuot. **Temple Ramat Zion has invited our congregation to their study**






TREE OF LIFE




